UN policy brief may look to a future of fewer blue helmets

The UN has launched an important policy brief on the future of multilaterial security - one of many papers in preparation for the 2024 Summit of the Future. The original Agenda for Peace (1992) offered a vision of a post-Cold War interventionist UN. This New Agenda still emphasises conflict prevention and peacebuilding, but marks a significant break. UN agencies have a supporting role rather than being key actors. Given the new phase of geostrategic competition, the UN must facilitate cooperation, not lead it.

Members are urged to formulate new guidelines/treaties, to reduce cyber-attacks, avoid an arms race in outer space, prohibit killer robots, manage military AI applications and tackle biohazards. It encourages the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) to be more active on security issues, and to "elevate" the Peacebuilding Commission.

As for climate, the majority of UN members are concerned about extreme weather, droughts etc impacting international stability. The Secretary General (UNSG) echoes this, calling on the Security Council and IPCC to pay greater heed to this topic. Overall,



Nobel Ambitions: The International Peace Bureau (IPB) has announced its intention to nominate three exceptional organisations for the 2024 Nobel Peace Prize.

The organisations are the Russian Movement of Conscientious Objectors, the Ukrainian Pacifist Movement and the Belarusian organisation *Our House*. The IPB says that their tireless efforts in advocating for the right to conscientious objection, plus a commitment to promoting human rights in their respective countries, make the three organisations deserving of recognition.

Bonn sparks plan for COP28 session on military emissions

Abolish War readers may remember that our colleague Deborah Burton of Tipping Point North South (TPNS) also represented MAW when she attended the annual UN Bonn Climate Change Conference in June with its focus on the Global Stocktake - a process to assess how well the Paris Agreement climate targets are being met and, crucially, to identify any gaps and opportunities for increased action.

Deborah was one of the speakers at a major side event addressing *The GST* and *Missing Military Emissions*. The room was fairly full and excellent feedback was received afterwards, mainly to the effect "we didn't know this issue was so big and so off the radar". Media coverage included *Deutsche Welle*, Reuters and China Global Television Network.

During the four day conference Deborah met with various country delegates. She also met with the Co-Chair of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) for National Greenhouse Gas Inventories.

The conversation included the potential for a Special IPCC report on Conflict Emissions. For such a proposal to be accepted would be a huge step forward.

Another extremely helpful conversation was with a former Chair of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice on how to further develop our submission to that committee on military emissions. Plans were made, in partnership with like-minded organisations, for side events on this issue to be held at COP28 in Dubai later this year, including one to be developed by Deborah on the links between military spending and emissions.

Story of Argentinian conscript brought to an English audience

In 1974, MAW Committee member David Collins was stationed in the Royal Marines unit in the Falkland Islands. Last year he was contacted (via Veterans for Peace) by Ariel Martinelli and Adolfo Byugar, about the creation of an English translation of their co-written graphic novel in Spanish called Tortas Fritas de Polenta. The novel narrated the true story of Ariel's traumatic experiences fighting as an Argentinian conscript during the 1982 war in the South Atlantic. In subsequent months, David worked with Professor McGuirk of Nottingham University and Mac Macdonald of Splash Editions, to translate and republish the book in English with a full introduction by David.

Prof McGuirk comments: "In 20 years, rarely have I encountered a text more directly capturing the irresponsibility, the futility of exposing ill-equipped young conscripts to peril, trauma and the unrelenting proximity of violent death."

Last month, David introduced the book and read out a moving plea for peace from Ariel to an audience at the play *Falkland Sound* at the RSC in Stratford-upon-Avon.
