Remembrance Lecture 2025: Ending Wars by Lord John Alderdice



Our lecturer this year, John Alderdice, was a consultant psychiatrist in Belfast with an interest in long-standing violent political conflict. He became Leader of Northern Ireland's Alliance Party and played a significant role in negotiating the 1998 Belfast/Good Friday Agreement. He is the founding Director of the Conference on the Resolution of Intractable Conflict, (CRIC) based in Oxford, and recently co-edited *Ending Wars*, published in August 2025, on the challenges of war and peace - and possible ways of addressing them. It promises to be a fascinating and very relevant talk.

BOOK REVIEW: Comparing Ukraine and Gaza

It is rare to read an analysis of both conflicts together, seeing them as symptoms of the same toxic political phenomena. Robin Luckham of Sussex's Institute of Development Studies - having spent decades writing on militarism, disarmament and development - has done exactly this.

This fine work is healthily academic in its attention to nuance, while maintaining a firm moral commitment to peaceful outcomes and a critique of imperialistic powers. Luckham confronts our key dilemma: while we rage at Israel and insist that Western powers must withdraw support, we are less united on sending weapons to Ukraine - victim of an imperialist invasion. The worst peril in both theatres is the risk of a nuclear detonation. The collapse of disarmament regimes and alarming increases in military spending do nothing to help. Among the many insights offered are the likelihood that Israel's "garrison state" mentality will undermine its own security in years to come; that, like Russia, it has "war aims but not peace goals". While the Middle Eastern focus is strictly on Gaza, the widening of the analysis to include the effects of both conflicts on the Global South, and in diverting attention away from planetary crises, is salutary.

The author has useful things to say about just and unjust wars; and he unearths the global roots of both wars, including unresolved clashes of rival imperialisms. He shows how the post-Cold War peace dividend has been replaced by a warmakers' dividend, in which 'security' wins over all else. He ends with a rapid survey of Trump's second-term measures on both theatres.

Overall, it is a grim assessment, offering no illusions about breakthroughs. But the work shows how our world is evolving and what must be done to rescue it from multiple cliff edges.

Update from the Bonn Climate Conference

At both the 2019 COP25 in Madrid and COP26 in Glasgow MAW picketed the delegates with our leaflets and "War Causes Climate Change and Climate Change Causes War" banner.

MAW is not eligible for COP accreditation, hence our sponsorship of Deborah Burton of Tipping Point North South (TPNS) to attend subsequent COPs including both the pre-COP in Bonn and the main COP in November in Belem, Brazil. Deborah reports from Bonn.

The Bonn Climate Conference is the preparatory COP gathering and, overall, the big concern was ambition most nations not being on track to stay within 1.5 degrees of warming and, linked to this, deep worries about insufficient plans for adaptation.

And with military spending at an all-time high, NATO's future plans for even higher spending, genocide ongoing in Palestine and the war in Ukraine with no end in sight, military-related issues were present "on the ground" if not on the official agenda.

Moreover, military spending is now being widely referenced as a potential source to tap for climate finance. Linked to this, TPNS launched its briefing, NATO's 3.5% Spending Goal: Unsustainable on Every Count, at a press conference with the Interfaith Liaison Committee on day one.

NATO's rapid military build-up is undermining global climate goals and diverting trillions from climate finance. As COP30 approaches, it's clear that we are on as wrong track as we can possibly be. The rich nations of the global north are massively investing in armaments while arming Israel's genocide. All this at the same time as they wilfully fail to meet mitigation targets and legal climate finance obligations.

Civil society is doing its very best to push the guilty parties - especially rich northern nations - to ceasefire; de-escalate; invest in just transition as we move towards COP30.

Focus on the work of the IPB

The International Peace Bureau is the world's oldest and broadest international peace movement network. The range of issues covered is impressive. It has recently highlighted the 50th anniversary of the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe, with its emphasis on common security. Ideally the CSCE (now OSCE) should be playing a role in bringing an end to the war in Ukraine. The IPB has also focused, in connection with the recent 80th anniversary of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings, on the usually-neglected colonialism dimension. Japan was not only a victim; it was, after all, a fascist regime which dominated E. Asia. See much more at: www.ipb.org/

US Nuclear Weapons return to USAF Lakenheath, Suffolk

Evidence is clear that US nuclear weapons have arrived at the Lakenheath NATO base in Suffolk, deadly weapons which make us all a target and increase the risk of Britain being dragged into Trump's reckless wars. As part of the actions to condemn Trump's shameful state visit last month, CND and the Lakenheath Alliance for Peace (LAP) moved a planned demonstration from RAF Marham in Norfolk - a significant Royal Air Force base for the F-35 Lightning stealth fighter jet - to USAF Lakenheath to say loud and clear that neither Trump nor his nuclear bombs are welcome here!

Lakenheath Alliance for Peace (LAP) - of which MAW is an alliance member - also organised a Peace not War educational/mobilising Tour in England and Wales. Kate Hudson, recently retired as General Secretary of CND and now a Vice-President, was one of the speakers. More talks are planned.

We reject the plan - imposed by the US and NATO - for us to spend 5% of our GDP on weapons and war. This will destroy all that's left of our public services, plunge millions into hardship and sow social conflict. We oppose the government's purchase of 12 F35A bombers from the US, capable of carrying nuclear bombs. This will cost



us vast sums and increase the UK's nuclear arsenal. This breaks international law and increases global risks. We reject the militarisation of society, the expansion of weapons and military production, the narrative that war is inevitable, and military encroachment on our schools and universities. We aim to build on the public outrage at these developments and what they mean for our society; raise awareness of the role of our government and arms companies in war crimes and genocide; explain the impact of nuclear weapons; mobilise for the demonstrations, camps, vigils and actions against British and US nuclear bombers and weapons at Lakenheath and Marham air bases in East Anglia.
