As our contribution to the Global Week of Action on Peace & Climate Justice in September, MAW, Tipping Point North South (TPNS) and Scientists for Global Responsibility (SGR) drafted a letter to Miatta Fahnbulleh MP, Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero urging her to take account of these emissions and to use her influence to have them included in reduction plans and targets. ## An institutional shift

Some of Pope Leo's 2026 encyclical letter, *Magnifica Humanitas* "on safeguarding the human person in the time of artificial intelligence" speaks directly to the agenda of MAW. The section headed *The Culture of Power* provides a nuanced analysis of the factors by which war is being normalised, including the crisis of multilateralism, the shaping of public opinion by algorithms that prioritise conflict, the loss of historical memory about the horrors of war, the economic interests which thrive on rearmament, weapons and AI, the abandoning of disarmament agreements and much more, all well explained. Before going on to propose five pathways for peacebuilding, Leo makes explicit a shift which has been evolving in recent Church teaching on war:

*"Today, more than ever, without prejudice to the right to self-defence in the strictest sense, it is important to reaffirm that the "just war" theory, which has all too often been used to justify any kind of war, is now outdated. Humanity possesses far more effective and capable tools for promoting human life and resolving conflicts, such as dialogue, diplomacy and forgiveness."* When this vast ship turns, the wake may rock some other boats.

## Chance to hear inspiring talks from Oxpeace Conference

St John's College Oxford hosted the annual Oxpeace Conference entitled *The Design of Peace: Re-imagining Directions for the UN at 80* in May.

An inspiring message from John Paul Lederach of Kroc Institute, University of Notre Dame, headed the programme: *"Remember that our most significant illusion is that we live at such great distance from the powerful actors and unfolding events that we are powerless. The inverse is true. We form part of the unfolding and as such we all have access to some piece of the great interdependence by which life happens and survives. Every daily conversation shaping meaning and response and seeking imaginative resistance and alternative to violence contributes to the shift toward dignity and care for humanity and this planet we share."*

Speakers included Professor Paul Rogers, Professor Sir Malcolm Evans, Rt Reverend Dr Rowan Williams, Dr Hugo Slim, Jane Kinninmont (CEO, UN Association-UK) Professor Richard Caplan and Professor Mark Owen and Ambassador Ebrahim Rasool, former South African Ambassador to the United States and Rabbi Dr Judith Rosen-Berry.

## Threats of insecurity and conscription hang over us: Your chance to say No

For the first time in generations, the threat of conscription in this country seems very real.

Seemingly endless, heartbreaking, illegal wars, driven by unhinged leaders who despise the rules-based international order, together with a rise in extremism and populism, have led to increased feelings of insecurity among the population.

The solution for many political and military leaders is a dramatic hike in military spending, accompanied by talk of national service.

Across Europe, conscription, or steps towards it, are on the rise. In Germany, men aged 18 to 20 are obliged to complete a questionnaire evaluating their physical fitness and other skills. Many are then required to attend mandatory military days with those deemed suitable being offered places in the army. As yet there is no obligation to accept the offers but the new law clearly facilitates future conscription. *Abolish War* readers involved in campaigning or conversations on security issues may find useful a new booklet, *Talking Points on Security Claims and Responses*, from Rethinking Security. It challenges the 'national security' orthodoxies, offering human security alternatives - <https://rethinkingsecurity.org.uk/supporters/talking-points-on-security-claims-and-responses/>

The UK working group for International Conscientious Objectors' Day - a coalition of 13 peace organisations including MAW, has launched a petition calling on the UK government to rule out the introduction of conscription. It was launched on CO Day 2026 and will be collated and handed in to Downing Street and the Ministry of Defence on the following CO Day - 15 May 2027.

## Peacebuilding through truth and reconciliation

### INMP conference report

The 12<sup>th</sup> International Conference of the International Network of Museums for Peace took place in August in Winnipeg. I felt very privileged to attend in person.

The theme was *Peacebuilding through Truth and Reconciliation*, a very apt focus given the global political climate in which we are currently operating.

The venue was the iconic Canadian Museum for Human Rights - purpose-built, the contemporary design incorporates several features that represent incompleteness to reflect the fact that tackling human rights and, indeed, social justice worldwide is never complete.

The conference was an opportunity to connect with like-minded people from across the globe, who are brought together by an overriding passion for seeking a peaceful world.

Much of the conference was expertly facilitated by Clive Barrett, former Chair of the Trustees of the Bradford Museum for Peace. Presentations were of a high standard, some based on individual research topics such as that on *Productive Discomfort* which was predicated on the premise that in order to grow, it is necessary to confront difficult experiences. The research explored the notion of confronting colonial guilt and shame. Leaving Winnipeg, I reflected on how much we have lost in terms of the connectedness to the natural world. Indigenous knowledge can teach us so much - the earth has the ability to sustain if only we treat it well and listen to it. The next conference will be in August 2029 in Cambodia.
